EUROPE 2020 ECONOMIC GOVERNANCE

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WEDNESDAY, 16 - JUNE 2010

The Commission, in its proposals on European economic governance, has not come forward with solutions for a more targeted economic policy coordination geared towards the development of a common budgetary strategy in the framework of a comprehensive Europe 2020 strategy in order to restore and enforce long term economic growth rates. S&D group considers that achieving sustainable public finances requires not just responsible spending, but also adequate and fair taxation, a more effective collection of taxes by the national tax authorities and a more intensive fight against tax evasion.

ASSESSMENT OF THE RESULTS OF THE 2006-2010 ROADMAP FOR EQUALITY BETWEEN WOMEN AND MEN AND FORWARD LOOKING RECOMMENDATIONS

The 2006-2010 Roadmap for equality is due to expire this year and the Commission has announced that it will draw up a new strategy in the autumn. The current strategy has served to highlight some key aspects of gender equality but has lacked the political force to translate it into practice. Beside that, there has been an inconsistency in the Community policies which has resulted in a situation where more than 85 million people, mostly women and children, have been reduced to poverty by a combination of unemployment, casual labour with a gender pay gap above 17%, low wages, pensions between minimum subsistence level and the difficulties of obtaining access to public services. Violence against women is continuing and trafficking has expanded. Women are also often exposed to multiple discrimination because of their sex, their age, disability, ethnic background and religion.



THE ORGANISATION OF THE WORKING TIME OF PERSONS PERFORMING MOBILE ROAD TRANSPORT ACTIVITIES

Having made a 180° turn in its position, the Commission proposal aims at excluding self-employed drivers from the scope of the road transport working time directive 15/2002.

Their exclusion would create a double regime in working time and insecurity on European roads. If not included, self-employed drivers could work up to 86 hours a week including heavy physical work such as loading, unloading, vehicle maintenance, etc.

All workers performing mobile transport on our roads must have limited working hours! Allowing some of them to work up to 86 hours a week would create insecurity on our roads and would lead to unfair competition in the transport sector! We must stop the Commission proposal.

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
